THE VIRCHOW PRIZE 2024 LAUREATES LUCY GILSON

Lucy Gilson is a globally renowned health policy and systems researcher who emphasizes the critical role of efficient health systems to ensure the well-being of populations worldwide. Currently, Gilson leads the Health Policy and Systems Division at the University of Cape Town's School of Public Health and holds a professorship at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine (LSHTM). Her academic background includes degrees in Politics, Philosophy, and Economics from Oxford University, a master's degree in development economics from the University of East Anglia, and a PhD in Health Economics from LSHTM. Gilson's career spans several influential roles, including her work in Swaziland's Ministry of Health and various research and leadership positions in South Africa and the UK. Her research, primarily focused on Sub-Saharan Africa and Asia, has global implications for health policy and systems.

Gilson's approach is characterized by close collaboration with decision-makers at various levels, advocating for people-centred health systems and transformative governance. She explores how health

services are organised, financed, and delivered, with a focus on equity, governance, and leadership. Gilson has significantly advanced Health Policy and Systems Research (HPSR) as a crucial field for improving health service delivery. Her work highlights the importance of interdisciplinarity and cross-sectoral collaboration, incorporating insights from sociology, anthropology, political science, and economics.

Her leadership development initiatives in South Africa and Kenya, published in *Health Policy and Planning*, have strengthened health system resilience by nurturing relationships among key actors. For her contributions, Gilson received the 2018 Lifetime Achievement Award from Health Systems Global and holds honorary positions at the University of Cape Town and the University of the Western Cape. Her work continues to be pivotal in advancing universal health coverage and equitable access to quality healthcare.

HOLISTIC AND SYSTEMS- GUARDING HUMAN AND HEALTH



THE VIRCHOW PRIZE 2024 LAUREATES JOHAN ROCKSTRÖM

Johan Rockström is a globally recognized scientist, celebrated for his profound contributions to understanding how efficient health systems and planetary boundaries are vital for sustaining life on Earth. Rockström, currently leading the Potsdam Institute for Climate Impact Research (PIK), has made formative contributions to the field of sustainable development. His groundbreaking work centres around the planetary boundaries framework, which he introduced in a 2009 *Nature* publication. This framework identifies nine critical environmental processes that define the “safe operating space” for humanity. By quantifying these boundaries, Rockström provided a scientific basis for understanding how crossing them risks triggering irreversible environmental changes, with direct consequences for human health. His 2023 study in *Nature*, highlighting that seven out of eight Earth System Boundaries have been transgressed, underscores the urgent need for global action.

Rockström’s influence extends beyond academia. He co-chaired the EAT-Lancet Commission, which proposed a universal healthy diet within the limits of

planetary boundaries, integrating food systems into the broader sustainability agenda. His work has shaped international policy debates and contributed to frameworks like the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

In addition to his research, Rockström has served on numerous scientific and advisory bodies, including the European Commission’s Mission Board on Climate Change. He has received multiple accolades, including the Tyler Prize for Environmental Achievement in 2024 and honorary doctorates from the Universities of Ghent and Amsterdam. His work represents a critical intersection of climate science, sustainability, and public health, offering a comprehensive approach to addressing the interconnected challenges of our time. Through his holistic vision, Rockström has significantly advanced the global understanding of the necessary steps for ensuring a sustainable and healthy future for all.

RUDOLF VIRCHOW



The Virchow Prize is named in honour of Rudolf Virchow – a physician at the Charité University Medicine Berlin and founder of the famous Berlin School of Medicine, which laid the foundation for today's Berlin School of Health. Born 200 years ago on October 13, 1821, Rudolf Virchow is a unique example of a great scientist, medical doctor, pathologist, anthropologist, sociologist and influential politician, who with his ideas, discoveries and activities, had profound impact on the health and well-being of people during his time through present day.

Virchow united in one person the interdisciplinary, intersectoral and humanistic concept of well-being which is needed today to improve health at a global scale. Rudolf Virchow is thus a role model and inspiration to overcome complexity and to bridge the great variety of challenges within health and related areas. He coined the famous concept that medicine is a social science.

Laureates of the Virchow Prize are shining examples in striving for these ambitious efforts, while providing inspiration to the community in improving health and well-being for all – our common and noble goal.

The Virchow Prize is an international award honouring laureates for their outstanding achievements in addressing today's global health challenges. Founded with a vision to simplify the complexity of global health and give a face to those who dedicate their lives to bridging these health areas and improving outcomes. Moreover, it aims to incentivize and spur future generations of great minds in their commitment to health.

With this award, stellar achievements towards "health for all" and for the planet's liveability are honoured.

Most importantly, these accomplishments must align and uphold the United Nations 2030 Agenda Sustainable Development Goals (UN SDGs) – an ambitious framework of action to carry the planet onto a more sustainable path.

The Virchow Prize, endowed with €500,000, is the first award of its kind to be intentionally established in direct connection to the UN SDGs, specifically addressing SDG 3 "Good Health and Well-Being". The Virchow Prize aims to serve as a beacon – shining brightly on the importance and interconnectedness of health, across all societies and cultures.

The Virchow Prize is awarded by the Virchow Foundation. The non-for-profit foundation was established on October 14, 2021, the 200th birthday of Rudolf Virchow, with the aim of preserving the legacy of this eminent Berlin physician, scholar, and politician, and to uphold the responsibility of science and the other sectors towards society in his spirit. The purpose of the Foundation shall be realised through the following measures:

- Awarding the Virchow Prize accompanied by expedient public relations work.
- Promotion of research projects and the application of research results.
- The networking of actors, groups of actors and sectors (civil society, NGOs, science, politics, business) relating to global health and public health at the national and international levels. Symposiums and conferences can be supported for this purpose.

For the activities beyond the Virchow Prize, the Virchow Foundation in close partnership with the World Health Summit (WHS) and will use the WHS as the primary platform.

THE VIRCHOW PRIZE TROPHY



The Virchow Prize trophy aspires to be recognised as a symbol of innovation and dedication to advancing health for all. This one-of-a-kind design provides a bridge between the past and future of global health. Its central feature is the glass specimen jar, curated from the Pathology Laboratory of the Charité University Medicine in Berlin. Estimated to be more than 100 years old, similar specimen jars were utilized by Rudolf Virchow himself to preserve medical discoveries and contribute to the advancement of science and education.

Suspended within each Virchow Prize trophy is a “specimen” that represents or symbolizes the long-standing work of the laureates and their unique contribution to global health. Within the trophy is a brass plate, laser etched with the name of the laureate and indicating the awarding year. The lid is additionally made of brass, etched with the image of Rudolf Virchow and sealed.

This original jar featuring the specimen, brass plate and lid will be showcased in the Berlin Museum of Medical History of the Charité for students and international guests to visit and learn from the achievements of the Virchow Prize Laureates – upholding Rudolf Virchow’s lifelong ambition to democratize and stimulate education.

WORLD HEALTH SUMMIT

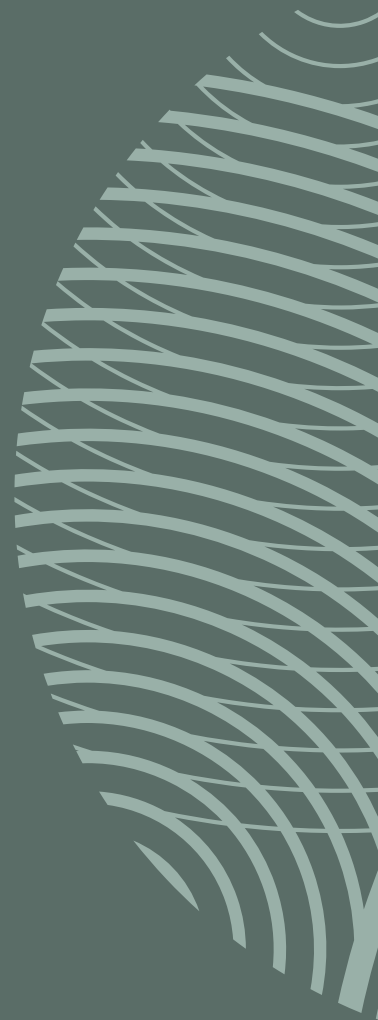
